What each level actually gets you

Start with the free column. The templates are published with read keys and anybody can take one — so what each paid step adds is only legible next to a column that does not have it. The licence row on its own explains the first step.

Every cell here is read off `data/offers.yml` or off a ruling, and a row whose cells would be a promise rather than a description is not on this table yet. What is still being specified is on the board rather than in a column.

How to read it

Every cell is read off something. A price comes from `data/offers.yml`, a capability from what that level's page says it gets, a licence from a ruling. A row whose five cells would be a *promise* rather than a *description* is not on this table — what is still being specified is on the board rather than in a column, because a table is the place where an unproven claim is hardest to notice and easiest to believe.

The free column is not a teaser. Fifteen template shapes are published with read keys, at riskmandate.ai. Go and open one before you buy anything here. That is not generosity and it is not a funnel: a policy nobody can check is a policy asking to be trusted, and the whole point of this document type is that it can be checked. **EXISTS AND RUNS 15 SEP 2026**

The licence is the first step, and it is the one worth understanding. What is published is Creative Commons Attribution, which obliges anybody using it to credit the source wherever it ends up — in a client report, inside a product, in a document that goes to a regulator. The paid levels replace that with a commercial licence to you over the same material. That is grantable because the copyright in the pack is ours: everything in it was written here. **The wording is not drafted yet**, and the ledger says so rather than this page implying otherwise. **READ, NOT RUN 16 SEP 2026**

The line that matters most is between the second and third rows of the middle group. Below it, the mandate is the starting one — written to be corrected, and correcting it is yours to do. No analytics. No cookies. No third-party fonts, scripts or CDN — every byte of this site is served from this domain. **Every page that sells anything opens no network connection at all**, and a build check holds that line. The one exception is named and narrow: a

review

of a vault embeds that vault from one host, through one vendored component, and says so on itself. Nothing anywhere here sends anything about you — no fetch, no beacon, no socket, on any page. Paying happens on the payment provider's own pages, which is the only place a card number should ever be typed: nothing on this site collects one. Prices are in pounds — pricing in euros while settling in pounds adds about two per cent.
